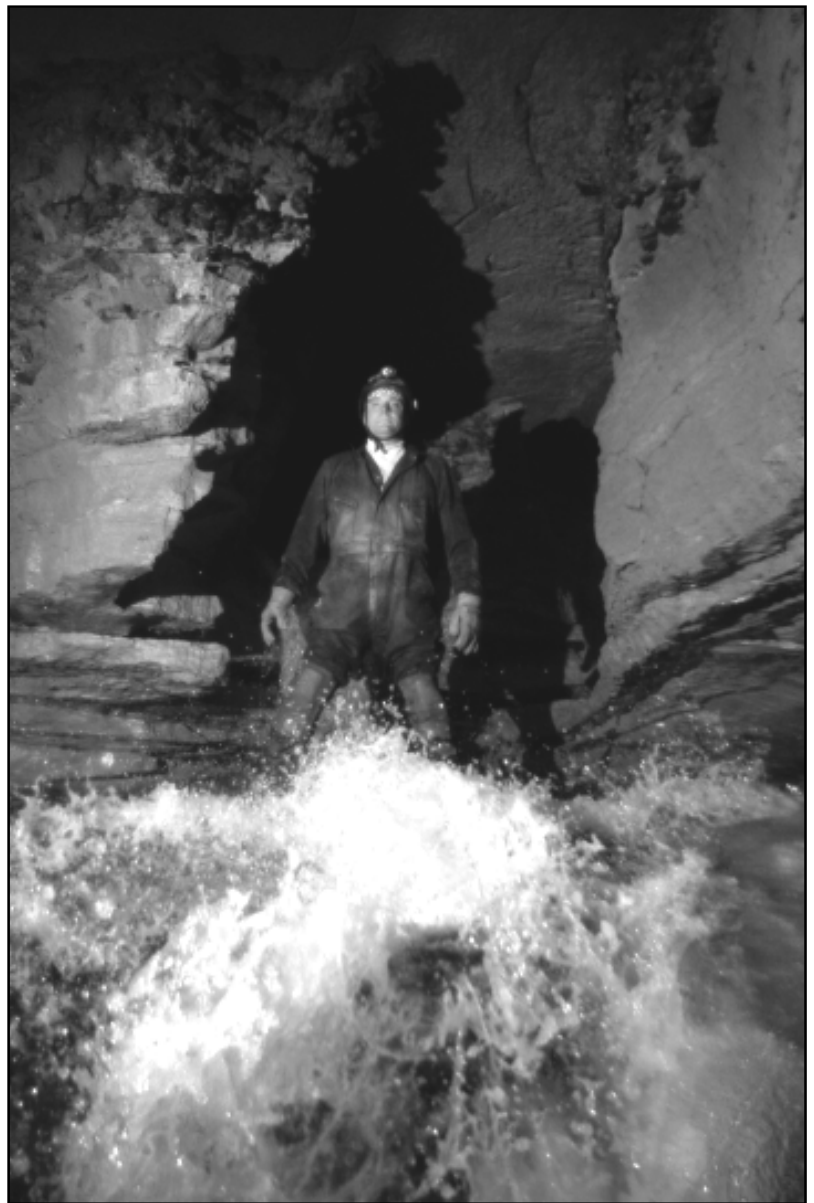
Caves & Caving – Exploring Kentucky’s Wild Caverns

Membership Meeting, Tuesday, April 3

Learn about Kentucky’s wild limestone caves and how to safely enjoy them from seasoned caver and MVOC member Andy Niekamp. Information about cavern formation, cave exploration, cave critters, speleothems, proper equipment and safe caving techniques will be presented. Andy’s talk will also highlight the historical importance of The Great Saltpetre Cave during the War of 1812 for the manufacturer of gunpowder and the role the cave played in events of the region up to the present. The program will begin at 7:00 p.m., preceded by the business meeting at 6:30 p.m. Come at 6:00 p.m. for socializing and trip planning. The meeting will be at Wegerzyn Garden Center, 1301 E. Siebenthaler Ave., Dayton.

Camping, Hiking and Caving at the Great Saltpetre Cave Preserve in Kentucky, April 27-29

Enjoy the spring wildflower season with some car camping, hiking and possibly wild caving. Join Andy Niekamp on a trip to the 305 acre Great Saltpetre Cave Preserve in the rugged foothills of the Appalachian Mountains near Mount Vernon, Kentucky in Rockcastle County, an area riddled with hundreds of caves.

The Great Saltpetre Cave is within walking distance of the camping area and is accessible to all ages. The cave is approximately one mile long and Andy will be leading several tours through it. No special equipment is required.

Andy will also be leading a beginners trip to the Sinks of the Roundstone Cave on Saturday for both seasoned and new cavers. The 3-4 hour trip is mainly walking through passages but some crawling, climbing and stooping is required. Plan on getting a bit wet and muddy. The cave contains the largest known cave passage in the region and has a very scenic entrance. Andy will help outfit those without the required gear.

There are also several hiking trails in the Preserve, if you prefer, or you can visit some of the many nearby tourist attractions.

The Preserve has primitive, RV, electrified and level campsites with city water, a picnic shelter, shower house, a pay phone, port-a-johns and outhouses. Although the Preserve and cave are closed to the public, special arrangements have been made to allow MVOC members to stay there for the weekend. Camping is \$4/person/night. The Preserve is located nine miles east of I-75 exit #59 on SR-1004.

Brokner Skunk Cabbage Hike March 11
